PEWS IN SANCTUARY ARE REINSTALLED

The pews were returned from North Carolina where they were stripped, sanded and lacquered to return them to the beauty and finish when they were purchased 80 years ago and all the nicks, scratches and visible wear and tear have been eliminated.

Every pew was disassembled for shipment so when they were returned, four men spent one week reassembling 42 pews and securing them to the floor. Each pew is seven pieces and must be put together like a giant three dimensional puzzle.

Unfortunately, they encountered installation issues and a number of pews had to be sent back to the restoration company. In the meantime chairs will be used as we did when all the pews were off site.

THE GARDENS OF ST. STEPHEN'S

One does not need to be a master gardener to appreciate the beautiful flower beds surrounding St. Stephen's. Walk up to the main entrance and around the building and you will see a variety of gardens with lovely perennials, annuals and bushes laid out with thought and care by Maren Christopher, St. Stephen's official gardener. Here is a description of five of the gardens she maintains including two new gardens she recently added.



Summer

THE FRONT DOOR GARDEN

This is the garden you see as you enter and exit the front doors of the church. It was redone several years ago in an effort to make our church entrance more welcoming both

from the street and from the church.

With this in mind, all the plants were chosen to maintain a low height so as not to block the entrance.

In spring red, yellow and orange tulips cover this garden and when they die back, annuals and perennials come to life.

THE SITTING GARDEN

This garden serves as the entrance to the cloister and the Memorial Garden. It is planted with pollinator-attracting plants. The stone path is planted with thyme that blooms in May and June and can be walked on.

When looking at the garden, take note of the two benches. Maren and Chance Ritchie, our sexton, made them during the summer of 2020. The benches provide a resting spot for contemplation or simply to enjoy the garden. There are leaf impressions on the seats from a variety of plants.

Next to one of the benches is a cement leaf bowl containing inspirational stones (Below). You may choose a stone that has significance for you and hold in in your hand while you pray for clarity, focus and intention.





THE CHAPEL HILL GARDEN

This garden, below the walkway from the Church to the Chapel, was replanted a few years ago when several trees were removed leaving the garden in full sun.

The existing hostas were dug up and moved to other areas around the church's grounds. Fragrant rugosa roses, colorful annuals, perennials and hydrangea grace this hill.



THE RAIN GARDEN

This new garden is located outside the new entrance to the Commons Room. It was created to collect water coming off the roof and the hard surfaces surrounding it.

The plants were chosen because they help reduce runoff and filter pollutants. They were also chosen because they attract pollinators.

The bench at the edge of the garden was also made by Maren and Chance.









THE CREEK WALL WALKWAY

Maren Christopher has served on the Properties Committee and continues to work closely with them on projects that affect the church grounds.

When the decision was made to renovate the Minnehaha Creek wall, Maren suggested a redesign of the area to add plantings along the edge of the creek wall plus a wide stone walkway between the plantings and the building.



First, the edge of the new wall was capped using the large stones from the original wall to give it a more finished look. (left)



Then, Maren and Chance laid paver stones in a random pattern for the walkway. It replaces a grassy area and provides a smooth sidewalk that will allow easy access from the Commons Room patio to the edge of the building where Baptisms in the Creek are performed.







THE CREEK WALL GARDEN

Thus, our newest garden, *The Creek Wall Garden*, was created. The plants in this garden soften the harshness of all the stone on either side of the new walkway. In time some of the shrubs will grow toward the wall to discourage walking along the stone capping.

When the capping was installed, cuts were made (below right) every so often to allow space for planting a trailing plant close to the edge that will grow to cascade over the wall and soften the creekside of the wall.

The plant color scheme is yellow, purple, maroon with hints of orange.

Note the enhancement in design from what the space looked like in September 2020.

MAREN CHRISTOPHER

For almost 20 years our "resident gardener" has tended our gardens with love and skill. She is a person of many talents and interests but, lucky for us, has chosen to concentrate on gardening.

Here is her story.

I began gardening at a young age when my mother offered me a patch of garden and told me I could choose what to plant. That began my passion with gardening.

Gardening remained an avocation while I pursued other careers of pediatric nursing and greeting card company owner. When I sold the card company I devoted myself to gardening and became a University of MN extension Master Gardener. From 2003-2019 I produced a Zone 4 gardening show and educational videos called 'Master Your Garden'. This was a Master Gardener project. I worked at Noerenberg Gardens and took design courses.

I began my garden management business, *Maren's Gardens* in 2003, providing garden design, install, seasonal containers, maintenance and consulting. It was at that time that St. Stephen's was looking to hire someone to care for, plant and maintain the gardens. They hired me as a contracted position and I became the "official gardener". I care for all the gardens around the church except for the hosta along the back and the Memorial Garden. The Memorial Garden is cared for by the Garden Committee volunteers and I am one of those volunteers. I am responsible for spring and fall cleanup, shrub trimming, planting annuals and maintaining the gardens.

When I designed the Memorial Garden as well as the gardens described earlier, I always consider several key elements. How will the garden be viewed? Is there a purpose for the garden? How much sun/shade does the garden get as this will determine which plants will thrive in the space. I consider bloom times so as to always have something of interest in the garden throughout the season and I choose complimentary plants to create a pleasing design. There are always challenges when designing any garden and I enjoy the challenge!

I graduated from St. Olaf College with majors in Nursing and Chinese Studies, which included courses in the language as well as culture, religion and philosophy. I became interested in the language and culture after our family hosted an AFS student my senior year in high school. She was Chinese from Malaysia and she quickly became part of our family. I spent five months of my junior year in Taiwan and Hong Kong continuing my study of the language and culture. At that time we were not allowed into mainland China! At one time I was able to read and speak Chinese fairly well, but years of non-use have left me with inadequate skills, to say the least.

When I'm not gardening, I love reading, knitting, paddle boarding and snowshoeing.

Over the years I have been active on the Vestry as well as Stewardship, Properties and Memorial Garden committees. I am an usher and I do Christmas greening of the church and Easter Floral display. Currently, with a group of others, I am helping to restore and maintain the labyrinth behind the church.

My roots at St. Stephen's run deep as both my parents' families were founding members and my paternal grandfather, Clint Christopher, was the inspiration and motivator behind the creation of St. Stephen's. I was baptized here and my husband, Scott Vergin, and I were married here. I am passionate about St. Stephen's and the gardens I care for.

CONTRIBUTE FUNDS.


A great way to support the Bash is by making a cash donation either online or via check. Every dollar matters! Mail a check to the church office (include "Bash 2021" in the memo line).
