SPEAKER: Bishop Michael Curry, Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church

"Faith and the Way of Love: Finding Hope in Troubled Times."



Join us to hear a lecture Bishop Curry gave on February 1, 2002, at St. Philip the Deacon Lutheran Church in Plymouth, MN, as part of their Faith & Life Lecture Series, which has run continuously since 2003.

Bishop Curry was one of five nationally known speakers invited in 2022 to reflect on how Christian faith is related to different dimensions of every day life.

His topic, *"Faith and the Way of Love,"* is a recognition of the challenges that are before us and an affirmation of the hope that can move us.

The Most Rev. Michael Bruce Curry is presiding bishop and primate of The Episcopal Church. At the church's 78th General Convention in June 2015, he was elected to a nine-year term in this role and installed in November of that year; he serves as The Episcopal Church's chief pastor, spokesperson, and president and chief executive officer.

Throughout his ministry, Bishop Curry has been a prophetic leader, particularly in the areas of racial reconciliation, climate

change, evangelism, immigration policy, and marriage equality. The animating vision and message of his ministry is Jesus of Nazareth and his way of radical, sacrificial love, and he regularly reminds Episcopalians they are "the Episcopal branch of the Jesus Movement."

Bishop Curry was ordained a priest in 1978 and served parishes in North Carolina, Ohio, and Maryland until his 2000 election as bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of North Carolina. He graduated with high honors from Hobart and Williams Smith Colleges and earned his Master of Divinity degree from Yale University. Bishop Curry is the author of five books and a regular guest on national and international media outlets.

A CHAT WITH OUR NEW ASSISTANT RECTOR: CHRISTY STANG

In June 2022 Tom Cook announced the call of the Rev. Christy Stang to serve as Assistant Rector with St. Stephen's Church. She recently completed her Masters Degree in Divinity at the Yale Divinity School in New Haven Connecticut, and has served as Deacon with Trinity Episcopal Church on the Green in New Haven since June 2021. She was ordained a priest on Saturday, June 18, 2022, at St. Mark's Cathedral in Minneapolis. Her first Sunday at St. Stephen's was July 3.



Tell us about your background and education.

When I began school, my mom decided to homeschool both my twin brother, Turner, and me and we continued all the way through high school. Being homeschooled allowed us to be more flexible with our time, take college classes, network and form friendships with people of all ages, and be involved in various research projects, jobs, and extracurricular activities that interested us. I went to Mount Holyoke College for my undergraduate degree, and I double majored in Psychology and English Literature, graduating in 2019. I chose to head straight to Yale Divinity School after college, and in May of 2022 I graduated with a Master of Divinity degree, a certificate from the Yale Institute of Sacred Music, and a Diploma in Anglican Studies from Berkeley Divinity School at Yale.

We understand you have roots in Minnesota.

I was born in Chapel Hill, North Carolina, but I lived in Minnesota from age one onward, so I consider myself a Minnesotan! My family lived in Eden Prairie until I was five, and then we all moved to Excelsior, where my parents still live now. I always loved Minnesota, and I had a hunch that I would feel drawn to come back after my education on the East Coast.

Did you always want to be a priest or did you have other goals before being called?

I always knew that I wanted to work with people, and for a brief period I was intrigued by the possibility of going into therapy, counseling, or social work. Around middle school, however, I started to hone in on my call to the priesthood. I considered it carefully in prayer, since I did not want to assume that the next automatic step for an involved layperson was to become a priest. After beginning to sense my call as a child and years of prayerful discernment afterwards, I knew with certainty by the end of high school that priesthood was what I was meant to do. Every day after becoming a priest has continued to convince me that this is what God wants me to be doing!

What do you do in your spare time?

I love to be creative in my spare time. I have been singing my whole life — choirs, musical theater, solos in church and casually composing songs in my free time. I have also been known to write poetry and flash fiction, which is fiction characterized by being very short, typically consisting of only a few hundred words. I also knit, decorate my house with hand-dyed silk or folded origami cranes, and make personalized toys for pets. Spending time with friends and family is also important to me, since my immediate family lives in Minnesota as well as a handful of my childhood friends.

What are your guilty pleasures?

I love savory snack food — spicy Doritos and salt and vinegar potato chips are some of my favorites. When I want to watch something that doesn't require much thinking, I enjoy watching reality dating and cooking TV shows. I also love to play video games with my twin brother, often ones that we played when we were little, and when we spend time together, we often pick up food from Subway or another fast food restaurant and hang out for hours at a time.

NEW LANDSCAPE ON WEST SIDE OF ST. STEPHEN'S

If you haven't driven by the church recently, you might not recognize the West side. Gone are the tall trees and shrubs that hid the building. In their place is new landscaping that opens up the view of the beautiful stone of the building and the side portico.

The new landscaping came about when *Cara and Dave Holmberg* expressed their interest in giving a memorial gift to honor her parents, *John and Mary Gould*, who were members here for many years until they passed away.

Cara says her parents loved the beauty of the church and loved gardening, so she and Dave began to consider outdoor projects that would be both a fitting tribute and that would enhance the exterior of the church. They talked to church leaders and to head gardener, *Maren Christopher*, and after looking at the landscaping on the West side of the building decided that area really needed a lot of work. The area had been planted 20 to 25 years ago and many plants were overgrown while others had died leaving gaps in the garden. Cara and Dave's gift enabled the complete rework of this landscaping area.

Tom Weigel, chair of the Properties Committee says, "The project was a complicated one and it's been a real collaboration. The final scope included not only the new landscaping but improvements to the irrigation to use less water while more effectively watering the plants." The

design also includes improvement to drainage to move water away from the building and guard against water seeping into the church.

Cara and Dave chose *Mangold Horticulture* and *Aqua Engineering* to complete the project but Tom, Maren, and our sexton, *Chance Ritchie*, were actively involved in the project. Cara says, "Having Maren involved is exactly what Mom and Dad would have wanted. We love the gardens around the church and we trusted that Maren and Mangold would make it fit together perfectly."

For two summers the landscaping around the church has undergone a gradual "refreshing," with new shrubs and plants replacing old ones. For this new re-landscaping Maren chose plants in keeping with the look of the other recent changes. In this shady side of the building the new plantings include a Pagoda Dogwood tree, shrubs such as Red Twigged Dogwood, Fothergilla, Rhododendron and Arborvitae. Maren also chose perennials such as Astilbes, Japanese Painted Ferns, Hostas and Heucheras. She also added some lovely annuals. The plants are spaced to grow and fill the area so they will not look crowded or overgrown as they mature.



A **new bench** was added to provide a place to sit while waiting for assistance into the church or to a car.

A bench has been added outside the sacristy doors facing 50th Street. (See photo left.) This new seating can be considered a tribute to both Cara and Maren's mothers. "We remember picking up our moms after church," said Maren. "There wasn't a place for them to sit while waiting and as they aged, this got harder and harder on them." This will be a welcome addition for many for years to come.

The landscaping update of the 50th Street side of the church is now complete and the area was dedicated after the 10:15 service on Sunday, August 14, 2022.

Thank you, Cara and Dave, for your thoughtfulness and your generosity. We are sure John and Mary would approve!

LIFE AT ST. STEPHEN'S SPRING 2022 **BRIDGE BUILDERS 65TH ANNIVERSARY**

Since the year 1957 over 125 members of St. Stephen's have made a commitment to support the long-term financial stability of our parish through a legacy gift to the St. Stephen's Fund. These people are called Bridge Builders, because their gifts are invested to build a bridge from the past to the future. On May 23, 2022, we gathered in the Commons Room to celebrate 65 years of gifts that have grown to a balance of over \$4 million as of December 2021.

The impact of these gifts entrusted to us over the past 65 years, whether large or small, are woven into the fabric of life for our parish. Behind the scenes, these funds quietly support our ministries every day while also providing a strong foundation on which the dreams and needs of the future generations of our parish can be fulfilled.

The evening was a time for fellowship and celebration and an opportunity to hear what inspired people to become Bridge Builders. At the end of the evening the emcee, Kevin Green, raised his glass and offered this toast:

Thank you to those Bridge Builders who have come before us, most of whom we do not know, but had the vision to benefit future generations unknown to them. Thank you, to those current Bridge Builders, for being inspired by the past while carrying on the lasting legacy of fulfilling the dreams and needs of future generations to come.

Finally, George Wanstall read the poem written by Miss Will Allen Dromgoole titled "The Bridge Builder." It was first read by the late Jim Curry in 1987 soon after the term Bridge Builders was ratified and has become an annual tradition to read it in recognition of Jim and the many generations of ideals and generosity for which we are grateful.

STAINED GLASS WINDOWS

We continue our occasional series on the stained glass windows in the sanctuary featuring two windows that have an overall theme of **CHILDREN**.

LEFT WINDOW

The theme of this window is the JESUS' INTEREST IN AND CONCERN FOR LITTLE CHILDREN.

The top panel shows a cross and a church..

The middle panel shows **Jesus and children** with the words, "Suffer the little children to come unto me" on the sides of the panel.

The bottom panel has a **Bible**, **a Star of Bethlehem and a manger of the Christ Child**..

The dedication at the bottom of the window reads:

To the glory of God and in thanksgiving for Margaret Carol Jensen.

* (The bottom panel is part of a hinged window, the frame of which covers some of the Star of Bethlehem and the manger.)



An interesting feature of the sanctuary windows is that they were designed in pairs.

One window depicts a Biblical story and its counterpart window shows an application of the theme in our life today.

These two windows can be seen on the right side of the nave.

RIGHT WINDOW

The application is CHILDREN'S RELATION AND SERVICE TO THEIR MASTER.

The top panel shows a cross and a church.

The middle panel shows a priest with children, one acolyte holding an American flag, another acolyte with a cross, a Boy Scout and a Girl Scout, and a boy and girl praying. The words "Love God and love thy neighbor" are on the sides of the panel.

The bottom panel shows a Latin cross that beams out to an orb — a symbol of the world below, symbolizing sovereignty of Christ over the world.

The dedication at the bottom of the window is to a child and reads:

To the Glory of God and in thanksgiving for Lawrence Stevens Turker (1927-1936)
